Sharing From Our Wednesday Evening Study

We are nearing the end of our eight-week study using the book *Signs of Life; Nurturing Spiritual Growth in Your Church* by Jay Sidebotham. It has been an interesting study. Although the book is focused on spiritual growth in your church, the church is made up of individuals, so, for me, it is about individual spiritual growth. How am I able to use the practices and suggestions to nurture my spiritual growth?

One chapter was about embedding scripture in everything. It began with the question, "What happens when Episcopalians read the Bible?" I found it interesting that we discussed this on July 3rd. The following Sunday, July 7th, Fr. Cristopher asked us to read Ephesians in preparation for his six-week sermon series. (Coincidence?) He also asked us to bring our favorite Bibles with us on Sundays, so we can refer to them as needed.

The role of scripture in our lives is explained in a series of questions in the Outline of Faith (also known as the Catechism) in the Book of Common Prayer:

Question: What are the Holy Scriptures?

Answer: The Holy Scriptures, commonly called the Bible, are the books of the Old and New Testaments; other books, called the Apocrypha, are often included in the Bible.

Question: What is the Old Testament?

Answer: The Old Testament consists of books written by the people of the Old Covenant, under the inspiration of them Holy Spirit, to show God at work in nature and history.

Question: What is the New Testament?

Answer: The New Testament consists of books written by the people of the New Covenant, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, to set forth the life and teachings of Jesus and to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom for all people.

Question: Why do we call the Holy Scriptures the Word of God?

Answer: We call them the Word of God because God inspired their human authors and because God still speaks to us through the Bible.

Question: How do we understand the meaning of the Bible?

Answer: We understand the meaning of the Bible by the help of the Holy Spirit, who guides the Church in the true interpretation of the Scriptures

Scripture is an important source of learning and hope. It has also been misused which is why it is important we read it in light of tradition, reason, and experience. According to Jay Sidebotham, "it is important we read scripture in community, in a way that welcomes questions and recognizes not only the usefulness but also the abuse that has been inflicted."

Jesus warned his disciples against idolatry of sacred text in John 5:39, "You search the scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that testify on my behalf." Or, as C.S. Lewis put it centuries later, "it is Christ himself, not the Bible, who is the true Word of God. The Bible, read in the right spirit and with the guidance of good teachers, will bring us to him."

That is how I hope, no, pray, to nurture my spiritual growth.

The History of Juneteenth

June 19th or "Juneteenth" commemorates the effective end of slavery in the United States. President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, stating all enslaved people in confederate states "shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free." The Proclamation, however, did not apply to slave-holding border states or rebel areas under union control. For the slaves in Texas, freedom did not come until two months after General Lee surrendered in Virginia. Federal troops arrived in Galveston TX on June 19, 1865, to take control of the state and ensure all enslaved people were freed. Slavery was formally abolished with the ratification of the 13th Amendment in December 1865.

Freedmen in Texas organized the first of what became an annual celebration, "Jubilee Day," on June 19, 1866. As black people migrated from Texas to other parts of the country so did the celebration. Juneteenth is considered the longest-running African American holiday. Texas was the first state to make it an official holiday in 1979. In June 2021 Congress passed a resolution to make it a federal holiday and President Biden signed it into law on June 17, 2021. (Source provided by Tarawanda Howard: What Is Juneteenth? | HISTORY)

August 7th is Purple Heart Day -- Since Congress had put a moratorium on promotions in the Continental Army due to a lack of funds, George Washington created the Badge of Military Merit award on August 7, 1782, to honor enlisted men deserving of recognition. In those days only commissioned officers were allowed to pass guards. This award gave a benefit to the enlisted men who warranted it; they were allowed the same privilege as the officers regarding passing the posted guards.

Unfortunately, it was basically forgotten after the Revolutionary War. Then, in 1932, Chief of Staff of the Army Douglas MacArthur renamed it the Purple Heart. By 1942 it was, and is today, awarded to those wounded or killed in military service.

Many communities like San Antonio have signs designating roads and towns as Purple Heart locations to publicly and repeatedly acknowledge their appreciation for the sacrifices made by our men and women in the armed forces. THANK YOU! THANK YOU!
