The Evidence of Faithfulness – The Epistle of James By Diane Woods

Please join us this Lent for a study of the Epistle of James. The six-week study provided by the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas and created by the Rev. Jamie George includes daily readings and reflections and outlines for a once-a-week group discussion. In her introduction, Rev. Jamie said:

"James is concerned with the purpose of our lives, which is to live in wholeness. This is as applicable to us today as it was when James wrote the letter. The evidence of faithfulness is a result of the outpouring of what Jesus is doing in our lives. The evidence in deeds of faithfulness lead to more wholeness individually and more unification communally through the love of Christ that calls us to love our neighbors as ourselves."

For five days of each week throughout this study, you will be invited to do five things: pray, read, reflect, contemplate, and carry. First, Rev. Jamie invites you to pray as you begin each day. She has provided a prayer from the Collects of the Book of Common Prayer. Second, you will be invited to read a portion of scripture. Third, you will be invited to reflect on the reading by answering a set of questions. Then, you will be invited to contemplate through different exercises. You may use any form of contemplation that calls you into a deeper relationship with yourself and God. Finally, you will be invited to carry a thought with you as you exit your study time.

Fr. Cristopher will lead the study which begins March 12th. We will meet in the parish hall at 6:00 p.m. The format for the evening begins with dinner (bring your own) and catching up with each other. Our discussion of that week's reading will start at 6:30 p.m. and closes with an Order for Compline at approximately 8:00. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Narthex on Sunday or you can call the office so we have enough copies of the study.

Brothers and sisters,

I'm grateful for the way the congregation has accepted (and even encouraged) my unusual volunteer ministry outside the parish serving as the chaplain (or character coach) to a college baseball team. This year, we're organizing a parish outing to come support my Saints. Come join your fellow parishioners for an afternoon of fun and fellowship and meet the players and families from my 'other congregation!'

We picked Saturday, March 29th, for a doubleheader against the visiting Louisiana Christian University Wildcats. The first pitch of game 1 (7 innings) will be at noon. Game 2 (9 innings) will start 30 minutes after game 1, which is usually approximately 2:30pm. Our hospitality folks will be feeding the team in between games, and volunteers to assist are welcome. (Last year we made sausage roll-ups; I'm not sure what the menu will be this year.)

The Saints from Our Lady of the Lake University play our home games at Missions Baseball Academy (MBA), which is on the southwest side of San Antonio at 5707 Highway 151, 78227. MBA is a tournament facility with a minimal concession stand and exposed bleacher seating. Hats, sunglasses, umbrellas to shield the sun, and clothing appropriate to being outside are HIGHLY recommended. (On the plus side, frequent USAF flyovers are pretty much guaranteed.)

For folks who tell me you're coming ahead of time, I'll buy your tickets and have them ready at the gate. A sign-up sheet will circulate in the narthex and Creasy Hall a few weeks in advance.

Our congregation will, once again, participate in the "40 Cans for Lent" Program. The program starts on March 5th (Ash Wednesday) and continues through April 18th (Good Friday). The program began in 2010 and has grown into an international program. Our contributions are donated to RACAP to help families in our local area. 

The Reverend Timothy John Vellom

January 22, 1958 – January 9, 2025



The Reverend Timothy John Vellom, beloved husband and father, and devoted Episcopal Priest in the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas, went home to the loving arms of Jesus on Thursday evening, January 9, 2025.

Tim was highly respected among his clergy peers, friends, and family for his wisdom, humility, compassion, integrity to the Gospel, and the ability to have fun. At the core of his soul he was a pastor. His care and concern for the people of his congregations are what moved and motivated him as a priest. He ministered to so many, both congregants and others, with deep compassion, humility, grace, and the certain knowledge that Jesus is Lord.

Tim was born January 22, 1958, into a Navy family to Capt. Lee S. and Anne P. Vellom. He spent most of his formative years in Charleston, SC, and attended Porter Gaud Episcopal School. He then went on to the University of the South where he met his wife of 44 years, Ann Rubsamen Vellom. They met singing in the music ministry of the Campus Christian group. Their love of music and singing was a mainstay in their marriage and an important part of the work they did together in the church.

Tim discerned his call to ministry at the age of 17. It was for this reason he had to ask Ann to marry him 4 times! She was not sure she was called to be a wife of a minister, but found there really was no other life she would have preferred. Ann and Tim were married at St. Mark's Episcopal Church on January 3, 1981. He was sent to seminary at Trinity Episcopal School for Ministry (now Trinity Anglican School for Ministry) under Bishop Scott Field Bailey, and was ordained to the diaconate on June 20, 1985, at St. Mark's. After the service, the Reverend Ed Harvey personally drove Tim and Ann to Corpus Christi where Tim served first as an assistant and then as an associate rector of All Saints' Episcopal Church until 1988. Tim was ordained to the priesthood at All Saints on January 3, 1986, on his fifth wedding anniversary to Ann.

While they were in Corpus Christi, Ann and Tim had two daughters, Hannah Elise and Sarah Grace. Tim shared with them his love of literature, music, and adventure. His empathy and gentleness made him an amazing father. He instilled in his children his values of compassion, service to others, and love of the world.

In the spring of 1988, Bishop John MacNaughton asked Tim to serve as Vicar of Trinity Church, Edna, with the charge of bringing it to full parish status in five years. With the Lord's help and confidence, Trinity Edna became a full parish in 4 years and called Tim as their rector. In 1993, Tim answered a call to serve as Rector of St. James Church and school in Del Rio, Texas. In Edna and Del Rio, Tim was very involved in the local ministerial alliances and as a volunteer chaplain to the hospitals. Tim spent the last 25 years of his active ministry as Rector of St. Matthew's, Universal City. During this time, he also ministered to the people of the Army Residence Community with weekly services and pastoral care. He cherished the relationships he formed with all his congregations, and they are forever held in his heart. (*Continued on next page*)

Tim also served the Diocese of West Texas in many ways. He was a dean for many sessions at Camp Capers and served on multiple Cursillo teams over the years. His diocesan work included, but was not limited to, serving on the Happening Board, Standing Committee, Executive Board, and the Examining Chaplains. He loved the Diocese of West Texas, its people and mission.

Outside the Diocese Tim also gave 25 years of service to Global Teams International, formally Episcopal World Mission. His work with Global Teams enabled many in the mission field to live out their passion for Christ and for people around the world, seeking to "see the heart of Christ in the skin of every culture".

Tim was "a friend of Bill" for over 35 years. He was committed to his sobriety and cherished the relationships he made through this fellowship.

Tim and Ann also spent the first year after his retirement volunteering at the Abode Home for the Dying. There Tim was able to continue to use his pastoral gifts for guests and their families during the holy time of their loved ones' last days.

Tim was preceded in death by his parents Lee "Skip" and Anne Vellom, his sister, Mary Beth Corning, and two infant brothers, Lee and James. He is survived by his loving wife Ann, daughter Hannah Elise Bradley (Matthew), daughter Sarah Grace Vellom, and two grandchildren. He is also survived by his siblings Dan, Paul (Karen), and Dottie (Luke), as well as his brother in law Rollins Rubsamen (Heather), and many nieces and nephews.

A memorial service and celebration of life will be held at 11am on Friday, February 28, 2025, at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, San Antonio, Texas. A private family interment at the Bishop Jones Center will follow after the reception. Clergy are invited to vest with white stoles and to process.

The family would like to thank Mr. Lonnie White for his care for Tim and the "great adventures" he and Tim enjoyed together. We also want to thank the team from Hosparus Hospice and the staff, nurses and caregivers of the Episcopal Church Home, Clingman neighborhood, Louisville, Kentucky.
